

#### From the Vicar of Roath, the Reverend Canon Stewart Lisk

My dear Friends,

At the time of writing, Summer has begun early and with an intense heat that is very unfamiliar to the residents of our city. We all keep wondering when the weather will break.

For the Vicarage family, it has been the backdrop to a very busy but also challenging few weeks. As most of you know we have moved out of Roath Vicarage whilst some major refurbishment work is being done, long standing damp and mould issues will be addressed, a new roof put on and replacement windows installed. We also look forward to a modern kitchen! This has entailed us moving every single possession to an empty Vicarage in Cathays where we are staying while the work is done.

We have had to unpack all we need for daily living but I can tell you that several thousand books will remain boxed until we return! Such an experience really makes you think about what you actually **need** for your personal, family and professional requirements, as it is very much business as usual for us all, with work, school and parochial and diocesan duties as busy as ever.

In the Gospel reading for Trinity 6, Jesus sends out the twelve disciples to cast out unclean spirits. He gives them specific instructions to go two by two and to travel light, just carry a staff and wear sandals but only have one tunic. They were not to have bread or money but rather they should rely on the generosity of the people whose houses they visit. The disciples did this and went out and cured many people.


Most of us could not survive without the many possessions that we accumulate but some people even today try to eschew worldly goods. I remember well an Anglican Franciscan Brother who regularly used to visit us at St Michael's College when I was training

for the Ordained Ministry. He only had what he carried from place to place in a small bag and depended on the welcome of those he came to minister to and received their hospitality. Such is a hard life but one where the Brother was unencumbered with the weight of goods that take up so much of our energy.

It is not possible for most of us to follow such a path but his and similar examples can make us think what is really important in our lives — all of us need to perform some life laundry from time to time. To assess the material things we have but also to value the spiritual, emotional and physical needs that make us the human beings that we seek to be. We can liberate ourselves to think on things heavenly rather than our earthly concerns and perhaps become better disciples as a result.

#### **NEWS FROM THE LYCHGATE**



Greetings from St Margaret's Church that must lie in the most beautiful churchyard in Cardiff. No wonder people would like to be married here! Some of us were talking about the yew tree by the church door. It would be nice to know more about it, so if you have any information, please get in touch.

Our first news report comes from Gill Day, who, with her companion Barbara Beavis, and Pat and Bob Hyett were honoured to receive invitations to a Buckingham Palace Garden Party. We too would like to thank all of them for their outstanding work for our parish over the years. This is Gill's report of the Day.

### **An Amazing Day Out**

"Imagine my surprise when I received a letter from the Lord Lieutenant of South Glamorgan asking if I would like to receive an invitation to attend a Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace. This honour was for community and voluntary work over the years. Of course I said yes! In due course an official invitation came from the Lord Chamberlain to attend on Thursday 31st May 2018. I invited Barbara Beavis as my guest – one of the founder members of the Ladies Circle alongside me over 40 years ago. Bob Hyett had been given a similar honour, so along with his wife Pat the four of us were to set off for London. This was after much agonising over what to wear – new outfits of course, and a HAT! Bob wore top hat and tails

and looked magnificent. We decided to stay overnight in London and travelled first class by train.

The weather forecast was not good, but the gods were looking down on us because it was a dry sunny day, all our prayers were answered. We set off in a luxury taxi which set us down at the end of a queue stretching around the side of the Palace! No ordinary queue, but one of ladies in a wonderful array of outfits and hats, men in morning dress, posh suits, uniforms and hats and some people in national costume. We attracted quite a lot of attention from people passing by. As usual the queue moved slowly forward, but soon the Palace gates were in sight. Passports, tickets and documents were checked and we entered the Palace forecourt, inching our way over the gravel and through the famous archway into the inner courtyard. We gave our tickets to an equerry who jokingly said the Queen would enjoy counting them tonight! Then we entered the Palace walking down a wide corridor lined with magnificent portraits and cabinets of fine china and on out into the sunshine onto the terrace overlooking the gardens. Scouts and Guides were on hand and kept busy taking photographs of us on our mobile phones before we descended the steps onto the lawn. A truly wonderful sight in glorious sunshine of around 4,000 people milling around with 2 military bands playing in the background. Incidentally there were lots of bishops many wearing their cassocks in various shades of purple which contrasted well with the flowing robes of eastern costume. I was told the Queen preferred the bishops to wear their cassocks to suits.

Everything seemed to proceed like clockwork, without us being told what to do and where to go. We joined one of the many queues in the refreshment tent and were quickly able to select sandwiches and cakes along with a choice of iced coffee, tea or apple juice to drink. Back in the sunshine we found a table to

sit and eat and watch the amazing sights before us. Then we noticed people beginning to line up on the lawn – we joined them. We had been told that maybe a Gentleman of the Household – identified by his morning suit, black top hat, buttonhole and rolled umbrella might approach us to line up to be introduced to the Queen, but no such luck for us! The buzz went around that the Queen was in attendance, along with the Duke of Cambridge, Princess Eugene and other royals. Fortunately for us the Queen was to come down the line we had joined. The Queen was wearing a dress and coat in two shades of blue with a matching hat with peacock feathers on the side. She stopped to talk to a small group opposite where we were standing so we had a really good view. Many people were remarking how tiny she was. As she passed by the line drifted away and we walked over towards where one of the bands was playing and began our tour of the gardens and lake. We were free to go whichever way we wanted. The rose garden was magnificent, there were beautiful trees and shrubs and a bank of hostas which I think had a royal decree which banned the invasion of slugs! We were able to stroll past the tennis court, past an enormous Grecian urn (must have been at least 10 feet high) and a pretty summer house. At the end of our tour of the gardens we skirted the other side of the lake and came back onto the lawn where we were offered refreshing glasses of lemon barley water and tubs of ice-cream. We saw the Yeomen Guard of Honour parade past the Royal Tea tent. By this time the crowds were beginning to disperse and we all began wending our way past the bands and back up the steps and into the Palace for one last glance out into the gardens and a final look at the decor and china displays before we walked through to the forecourt and out to the gates to look for a taxi back to our hotel.

All in all a wonderful honour and experience and thanks to modern technology we all had plenty of photographs on our mobile phones to remind us of a magical afternoon, never to be repeated, but with so many memories and so much to tell our families and friends.

with you all. We extend our best wishes to Pat and John for the future.




It rather surprised Kath, so we are wondering just how many people may be in church!!
