## From the Vicar of Roath, the Reverend Canon Stewart Lisk My dear Friends,

At the time of writing we are within the Remembrance season. I was privileged to attend the Wales Festival of Remembrance at St David's Hall. The Head of the Royal British Legion in Wales, Anthony Metcalfe reminded us that the R.B.L. theme at this time is not only remembering the Fallen but also looking forward with hope to the future. There is a desire to involve more young people in our events at Remembrance time. I am glad to say our uniformed groups always play a pivotal role in our united Parish Remembrance Service at St Edwards and in our choirs with more young people joining.

Those who came home from the First and Second World Wars did so with mixed feelings, a sense of relief that peace had come and they were reunited with their families but also a great sorrow and grief that they had lost so many of their comrades. As they returned to civilian life things were often tough as there was a depression in the 1920s and 1930s and much unemployment. In the post 1945 period there was great austerity and rationing continued for some years.

The parliamentary process however continued in both periods of history. In 1918 a Conservative government was elected with Liberal party support but by 1923 the first Labour minority government had replaced them. In 1945, Winston Churchill the wartime Prime Minister lost the election in a massive Labour landslide forming their first majority government. No doubt hope for the future was at the forefront of the minds of the electors those times.

Fortunately though we now face a general election it is not in a post conflict era. However it is undoubtedly at a crucial moment in our nation's recent history. We have enjoyed largely a period of peace since 1945. Nevertheless British armed forces

personnel have died in conflict somewhere in the world every year since the end of the Second World War, except in 1968. It is not appropriate for us in these pages to promote any of the individual parties. There are many vehicles for that around! However the freedom that was brought at such a great cost by the lives of so many should not be taken for granted. The privilege of using our votes is a duty that all who are eligible should exercise. We as Christians must care for our parish, community and nation and it is important that we use our franchise with thought and wisdom.

This is also a time when we should pray for our leaders as they all seek high office in Parliament. Many of them are calling for national unity and healing. Those of us who seek to follow the Lord Jesus can only agree with such sentiments. As we approach the Advent season, a solemn time in the Church Year, let us pray that the message of peace and hope that we believe the Messiah would bring may prevail in this and every other nation on earth.

## **Llandaff Diocesan Conference 2019**

This year I was the Parish representative at the conference. I was very eager to listen carefully and take some notes so that I could return and write an account of what happened at the annual conference.

The business side of the meeting had been dealt with in the summer at a meeting in the Cathedral. Nomination papers for the election of members to the Governing Body, Electoral College and Diocesan Board of Finance had also been distributed. Heather Doe had previously been a member of GB and Electoral College and again Heather has been accepted as a member of both reflecting her hard work and involvement in the work of these bodies.

The Conference was held in Aberdare, and I travelled up to Aberdare with Stewart and Caroline Downes (who sends all of you in Roath her best wishes).

The conference opened with a Eucharist and then Bishop June spoke giving the Presidential Address. She called the Diocese to new adventures during the coming year of Pilgrimage, and shared with us a number of disturbing facts.

- 1) Churches in the Gwent valleys had lost 37% of membership and this loss was also reflected in our Diocese.
- 2) The UK census showed half the population were of no religion.
- 3) People had lost trust in the Church.

When visiting the parishes in the Diocese the Bishop had noted;

- 1) A lack of young people (-30) in our churches and the church did not seem to be connecting with these young people and children.
- 2) How churches were vital in many communities, combating austerity and supporting the needs of the homeless.

The Bishop invited us to be a Diocese with a joyful character, this joy being born of deep seated love of God. She encouraged us to be an ambitious Diocese, taking on outstanding challenges and targets.

### As a Diocese;

- 1) We need people to change how they see the Church.
- 2) We need people to see what faith has to offer and how faith can matter to them.
- 3) We must connect with the needs of our parishes.
- 4) We must release the burden that buildings and worship can bring and refocus on what our neighbourhoods need.
- 5) We must see how our churches can be involved with the epidemic of loneliness, of self-harm and mental health disorders in young people,

and so impact positively on health and wellbeing. Can we as a Church make a difference?

The Bishop spoke about the impact of technology, the ethical debate about data harvesting, about social cohesion and how we live together, to love one another and asked us to think about what it means to live well together in this way.

Finally the Bishop spoke about the year of Pilgrimage 2020, stating that a Pilgrimage takes on many forms, so is available to all people. Pilgrimage is about journey, a journey with meaning and spiritual impact, we can draw in our neighbours, we can walk and talk, we can be together as companions.

The Bishop finished by asking us:-

"What does it mean for you to be a pilgrim in our year of Pilgrimage?"

Matthew Batten, Director of Communication and Engagement spoke to us about the importance of social media in today's world. Facebook, YouTube, Twitter, Instagram and smart phones should be our means of communication. He did not put aside a place for print for example Croeso but informed us that this would also be available now in digital form. It seems our front door is now a Facebook page because that is where the majority of people go to keep in touch. Some examples of good practice were shared eg. videos posted on YouTube by Mothers Union.

Technology is a great way we can share our joyful story. YouTube is a great tool it presents us with opportunities for seeing debate and provides excellent resources for education, 12 digital apostles, were mentioned.

As advocates for our Christian faith we have a responsibility for how we share our good news so that lots more people can engage and we need to be using technology to do this.

A new website would be launched in November for Llandaff Diocese.

This session finished with a discussion on the following.

How would we describe the character of the Diocese and how would we like others to see our Diocese?

Sarah Ricketts (The Vision 2020 Group lead) spoke to the Conference and brought together all the work that had been undertaken by the 4 Diocesan working groups;,

- 1) Outreach,
- 2) Ministry,
- 3) Education and Young People,
- 4) Support and Communications.

These groups formulated actions and ideas to feed into the new vision of the Diocese – Where Faith Matters-. The Vision 2020 Group had overseen these many ideas, and after much discussion priorities, together with actions, were drawn up to enable the Diocese to best deliver the vision.

The Diocese Vision calls us to - Tell a joyful story
Grow the Kingdom of God
Build our capacity for good

To deliver this Vision;

- We must shift our focus to outreach and the needs of our local communities.
- \* Embrace the opportunities in our Church schools and develop our links in LA schools.
- \* Work better to communicate and share the Christian message.
- \* Provide support with buildings, finance and personnel.
- \* Build and grow a faithful Church.
- \* Engage with -30 year olds and children.
- \* Increase the voice of laity.
- \* Increase vocation to ordination and lay ministry.

The Diocese had £3 million to support these developments and were in the process of bidding for a further £3 million from the Provincial Evangelism fund.

This money would be used to provide;

Engagement workers for schools etc.

Project Leaders and Mission enablers.

Outreach Co-ordinators.

Lay Training Officers.

Vocation Advocates.

Support for the well-being of leaders.

In addition the funds would be used to develop a Resource Church in the Diocese primarily for the <30 year olds and create a centre for mission, to continue outreach work. Provide School pastors and establish a Vocation Road Show.

Further resources for Mission would provide;

- 1) Church Development Officers to give support and help for eg quinquennial inspections,
- 2) Support in Communications, in this digital age.
- 3) Building development support,
- 4) Examples of best practice for financial and fundraising support.

The session gave us an idea of this massive Diocesan plan that would depend to some extent on the funding awarded.

The final session was given by the personnel who work in the Cathedral. The Dean Reverend Gerwyn Capon talked a little about the Governance history of the Cathedral and how this had now been changed so Governance was now 'fit for purpose'. Lay Canons had been appointed for the first time and the number of clergy had been strengthened. There was an intention to diversify the worship provision and the Cathedral staff wanted everyone to feel comfortable in the Cathedral.

Reverend Mark Preece had been appointed Resident Canon Precentor responsible for music, worship, litany, organists, choirs etc. The Cathedral was looking at ways to engage with the community with the upcoming year of Pilgrimage and the 900<sup>th</sup> year anniversary of the Cathedral to celebrate. The staff of the Cathedral were keen that the Cathedral gave people an encounter with God and provided worship that reflects life, and touches the life of the Diocese.

Canon Chancellor Dr Jan van der Lely had also been appointed, she has a Pastoral and Educational role, including visitor experience. New initiatives were being introduced eg. Diocesan Prayer Intentions, providing opportunities for much closer links to parishes, as incumbents were invited to send representatives from their parish, who may like to read for example at the services on these occasions, and it was hoped reciprocal prayers would be said in the Parish involved. Cathedral clergy were also available to take services for us in our parishes on Sundays.

Throughout 2020 the Cathedral would hold 3 celebration days, on 17<sup>th</sup> October Parish choirs were to be invited to join as a mass choir to sing evensong.

A digital children's trail was planned together with children's Pilgrimage visits.

We were informed that areas of the Cathedral not previously seen such as the Bell Tower and the vestments would be made available to visitors and the Cathedral website would be updated and improved.

The conference ended with the presentation of a Pilgrim Staff from St Asaph Diocese and a hugely enthusiastic presentation about Pilgrimage. 2020 is the Diocesan year of Pilgrimage and booklets to help us prepare and organise pilgrimages were made available for us to bring back to our parishes.

The Conference shared a huge amount of information as you can see. The Diocese has a big agenda over the next 5 years, let's pray for God's blessings and its fulfilment.

Sally reports that the vicar announced that the centenary songs of praise for the 19<sup>th</sup> Cardiff Scout Group was very well attended and it was a very special day.


